

ABSTRACT

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The Relationship between Forgiveness Motivations and Resilience in Adolescent Victims of Cyberbullying; Widya Risnawaty, M. Psi, Psi.; Undergraduate Study of Psychology, Tarumanagara University (i-ix; 53 pages; R1-R8; Appdx 1-27)

This study attempted to investigate the relationship between forgiveness motivations and resilience in adolescent victims of cyberbullying. Along with the increasing number of internet usage, the phenomenon of cyberbullying also continues to increase. The impact of cyberbullying is that victims of cyberbullying tend not to be resilient and thus lead to increased depression. To deal with this situation, people are using forgiveness as a coping strategy to increase resilience. This research is a quantitative research with correlational research methods. The measuring instruments that use to measure forgiveness is Transgression Interpersonal Motivation Inventory (TRIM-18) by McCullough, Root, and Cohen (2006) and resilience is using instrument belongs to The Research and Measurement Section of Psychology Faculty of Tarumanagara University. The sampling technique is using non-probability purposive sampling technique. Participants in this study were 209 adolescent victims of cyberbullying, between the ages of 12-18 years old. The result shows that there is no relationship between avoidance motivations and resilience ($r = - 0.124$, $p = 0.064 > 0.05$), while revenge motivations have a negative and significant relationship with resilience ($r = - 0.303$, $p = 0.000 < 0.05$), and benevolence motivations have a positive and significant relationship with resilience ($r = 0.249$, $p = 0.000 < 0.05$).
